For those of you who missed this event and would like to see for themselves, there are ways and means to remedy the situation:

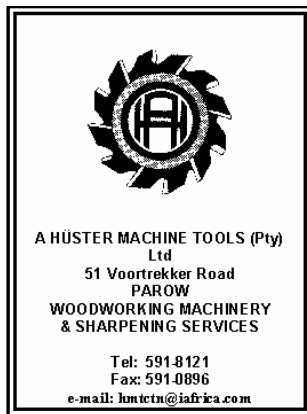

FROM THE MEMBERS

CRAFT SUPPLIES COURSE IN FRANCE

As woodturners we all know of Craft Supplies at Millers Dale in Derbyshire, UK, and some of us have even enjoyed a woodturning course there. However, how many know that Craft Supplies now run courses at a recently established training centre in France? I was privileged to be one of the turners on the inaugural course last year.

It all started just before Christmas 1999 when we received a card from Nick Davidson, the MD/CEO of Craft Supplies, on which he mentioned that they had purchased an old water mill alongside the River Arize in the foothills of the Pyrenees, where they would be running intermediate woodturning courses during the European autumn of 2000. Anyone who was interested should make contact. My wife was

keen on the idea, so we asked for more details and settled for the course from 11 - 15 September.

The course was to last five days - working in the mornings and free in the afternoons to explore this beautiful area, not all that far from Andorra. Five candidates can take part and the excellent accommodation caters for accompanying wives/partners. The courses are all in English, so language is not a problem. Jamie Wallwin had been persuaded to come out of retirement and was our tutor.

Some chose to drive, while others like us flew from Stanstead (UK) to Carcassonne, about 1½ hours from Le Moulin de la Materette where it all happens. We picked up our hire car and took our time reaching "Le Moulin".

By late Sunday afternoon everybody had arrived; 3 couples plus Vic and David on their own. Jamie's wife Charmaine also came as well as the Davidson family of Nick and Fran, their daughter Emma and son Tom, as well as Steve a delightful young Australian working his way around Europe.

After official introductions over a drink, we had dinner on the stoep, with the sound of running water and owls in the background. The food was excellent as was the local wine. After coffee we were offered Armagnac and some Muratie Port I had brought along, which impressed all those who like Port.

We all retired to our spacious and comfortable rooms with en suite bathroom or shower room and we slept like logs.

The real business of the 5 day course started on Monday morning after an excellent breakfast. Jamie was waiting for us at 08h30 in the workshop, which is a separate building, and wood store, housing 5 new lathes; 2 Record and 3 Woodfast, as well as a large Wadkin band saw. Each student was allocated a lathe and supplied with a set of "Home of Woodturning" (Craft Supplies) turning tools and a clamp on angle poise lamp. There was also a table with a large variety of more specialised tools which could be used by anybody.

After a short talk by Jamie on the rules of the workshop and safety, each of us had to give brief details of their turning experience/courses and type of lathe owned.

We would be involved in 5 projects namely

- a) advanced spindle turning
- b) a box
- c) a platter
- d) a natural edge bowl
- e) a deep hollow form

Jamie watched over us, always ready to assist. He has the uncanny ability of offering advice and assistance just at the right moment. During mid-morning tea break we would see how others were progressing. The workshop was a hive of activity and concentration, and time just flew by.

We often wished we could have worked in the afternoon as well, but the holiday aspect of the trip had to be remembered.

The region is scenically beautiful and away from touristy crowds and places. There are castles and caves, golf and trout fishing, fresh air and country roads and little villages with markets. Very much an unspoilt area of France. At dinner each evening we would discuss what we had done and seen. Nick was always available to give advice on where and what to see and do. Some went as far as Andorra and although not all that far, the trip took longer than expected as the road is very tortuous.

After dinner when it cooled down we would move into the large lounge, light a log fire and enjoy lively conversation. On a couple of evenings Nick entertained us with tunes and songs played on his handmade guitar. There were also numerous woodturning books and beautiful examples of turned objects everywhere.

On one of the nights we were all invited to dinner at a nearby bistro where we enjoyed a typical French meal of the region. As it was the inaugural course, my wife and I decided we should all sign our names in a pictorial book of Cape Town which, we presented to Fran and Nick.

The week passed quickly and one realised how much one had done and learnt in those five busy days, not forgetting the camaraderie of an "in house" course.
